

WEEK THREE | CONTROVERSY AND CONFLICT

TALK ABOUT IT

I'm going to take a little different approach here. Instead of reading the miracles, I want us to read the reaction. The premise here is that people were coming to Jesus for physical healing. Is that what they needed? Not much has changed.

Read Mark 2:6-12, 15-16; 3:4-6

Can you share a story about when you got what you needed rather than what you wanted?

How do you or do you often see others react when prayers are not "answered" or answered like they hoped or wanted?

Where do you often see the goal of purity and righteousness conflict with compassion and love? These are not opposing forces. Ideally, we want them to co-mingle together, but...

APPLY IT

Read Mark 2:3-5 one more time.

When are you most likely to pray? (more than just a dinner prayer.)

Do you have friends or family like those men? Talk about your faith community or lack of one. Who are they?

What do you think about having people available for prayer on Sundays (benefits)?

PRAY

It's always beneficial to close your time together by simply checking in on one another. We may never know what's going on in one another's lives unless we open a door and ask.
